Ofsted report 2015: The school has used its primary school sport funding successfully to ensure that pupils learn and take part in a growing range of sports including tennis and 'Hi Fi' netball. It has also provided them with more opportunities for competitive sport with other schools. Teachers' subject knowledge and skills are enhanced by the work they do alongside specialist coaches.	
Well-qualified staff delivering good quality PE lessons ensuring high level of engagement of children with PE lessons	Further staff training including swimming and swimming safer supervision.
Engagement of children with after school sport clubs	Continue to offer subsidized after school clubs.
