Key achievements to date:	Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:
<p>All pupils leave Y6 being able to swim.</p> <p>Introduction of Daily Mile</p> <p>Installation of play equipment in the playground.</p> <p>Ofsted report 2015: <i>The school has used its primary school sport funding successfully to ensure that pupils learn and take part in a growing range of sports including tennis and 'Hi Fi' netball. It has also provided them with more opportunities for competitive sport with other schools. Teachers' subject knowledge and skills are enhanced by the work they do alongside specialist coaches.</i></p> <p>Well-qualified staff delivering good quality PE lessons ensuring high level of engagement of children with PE lessons</p> <p>Engagement of children with after school sport clubs</p> <p>Successful participation at sporting fixtures</p> <p>The school 'signposts' out of school sports clubs for pupils who show an aptitude, ability or skill in a specific sport e.g. dancing, basketball and football.</p>	<p>Continue to provide swimming to all year groups in order to build on progression of swimming skills and water confidence.</p> <p>Consider development of an all-weather daily mile options.</p> <p>Further staff training including swimming and swimming safer supervision.</p> <p>Continue to offer subsidized after school clubs.</p> <p>Improve / increase the number of sporting competitions and fixtures attended. This would mean earmarking funding for transport.</p> <p>Continue and further develop signposting to counteract rurality issues so that more children are participating in sports out of school.</p>

However, the school feels strongly that regular exercise and the opportunity to experience all that a gymnasium has to offer is an essential part of the PE curriculum and the rurality of the school means that many parents do not take children to gymnastics lessons out of school. For this reason, for the past three years, the school has organised a Gymnastics course at Lynnsport Gym, in King's Lynn. This provides a sporting opportunity that would not otherwise be available.
